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Series Update: God's Design Marriage Misconceptions

I. The First Marriage: Genesis 2:18-25

Men and Women, co-image bearers, given a mandate to fulfill together. (Genesis 1:26-28)

A. Designed for Intimacy

Genesis 2: 18 Then the Lord God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him."

Genesis 2:24-25 Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh. ²⁵ And the man and his wife were both naked and were not ashamed.

B. Designed to Fulfill a Calling

God designed marriage to be a covenant relationship between one man and one woman. He designed marriage for human flourishing, intimacy, and joy.

II. The Christ Centered Marriage: Ephesians 5:18-33

Background: *Our identity: In Christ *Our power: The Holy Spirit See **Eph 1:3-5**; **5:18-21**

A. Wives who live like Jesus

Eph. 5:22-24: Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church, His body, and is Himself its Savior. Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit in everything to their husbands.

Wives... the greatest gift you give your husbands is...

B. Husbands who love like Jesus

Eph. 5:25 Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave Himself up for her

C. The Gospel on Display

Ephesians 5:32-33: This mystery is profound, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church. However, let each one of you love his wife as himself, and let the wife see that she respects her husband.

Husbands... the greatest gift you give your wives is...

God designed marriage to become a beautiful picture of God's sacrificial love for His people. Rooted in Christ and empowered by the Spirit, the husband/ wife roles become an expression of worship as each role emulates Jesus and the roles He plays to love and serve us.

For Further Study

- In Matthew 19:1-12 we learn what Jesus taught about marriage. As you read this section, notice that He quotes from Genesis 2—He did not change the original design for marriage—He upheld the design of marriage from the first marriage described in Genesis 2. Notice too the alternative He gave to marriage in verses 10-12. Next week we will address Biblical singleness.
- 2. Ephesians 5:18-33 is the longest section in the New Testament devoted to the topic of marriage. It is crucial to read this passage in the context of the whole book of Ephesians. What you will find is that God's design for marriage is that the husband and wife are first grounded in their identity "in Christ", and then through the power of the Holy Spirit to be able to freely share all God has given him/her with their spouse—which shows the world what God has done for His people! Look at these passages to get a glimpse of all that God has lavished on us through Jesus: Ephesians 1:3-5; 1:7-10, 1:11-14; 1:18-21; 2:1-10. Make a list of all that God has lavished on you through Jesus.
